Philosophy of Teaching and Learning

First and foremost, my philosophy of education is based on both essentialism and progressivism in nature. While I believe there is a core of basic skills that all students should learn and that students must learn to conform to the social norms of society in order to be a successful citizen, I just as strongly believe that you have to educate the whole child and that education is active not passive.

There are fundamental skills that all students must possess to be successful. They are the basic core, the building blocks, for all future educational endeavors and cannot be replaced or omitted. Education is a scaffolding of skills and a foundation must first be laid before it can be built upon.

I am strong proponent of Howard Gardner and strongly believe in learning styles. It is part of my practice every year to administer multiple learning style tests to my students and educate them as to what their personal style is and how it can be used to assist them in becoming a more successful student. I believe all educators should teach to a variety of learning styles because all students do not learn the same way.

I also share the progressive belief that students should be problem solvers and thinkers and that meaning comes through experience. I see education as an active process that requires students' participation in learning. To be successful in today's society the students have to learn to problem solve and think on higher levels; these skills must be taught and put into practice in education. Students must also be taught to work along side their peers, collaboratively. Part of this process is working through differences, learning to compromise, and to respect opinions and beliefs that differ from your own.

I believe in educating the whole student: cognitively, socially, and morally. If you only teach one aspect, the student will not be well rounded. In today's society, the significance placed on moral standards is declining, which too often results in an indecisive adult. I do not accept this and believe character education is necessary in order to graduate a young adult that can successfully function in today's world.

A teacher's attitude has a significant impact on their students. As such, educators must find a way to remain positive and hold fast to the belief that all students can learn. They must maintain high expectations, be willing to individualize and differentiate instruction, get to know their students, and influence them in a manner that makes the students want to be at school.

Teachers should be highly qualified and well trained. It is no longer enough for educators to just successfully complete a teacher education program. As educators, we are life long learners and in order to remain effective as such we should always be in pursuit of learning. Teachers cannot let themselves become complacent in the classroom. They should be growing and stretching

themselves; the classroom is constantly changing. They should be well acquainted with current educational research and strive to implement such practices into their classrooms. The teacher has to remain current on trends and methods in order to adequately prepare our students for the future. Additionally administrators are the leaders of the school and must be bold in encouraging teachers to try new methods and not be hesitant to make changes if the changes are for the benefit of the student.

I believe not all students follow the same path in education. Some will go to college while others will join the work force; both should be adequately prepared. For the college bound students, this means they need to be challenged academically and experience a higher degree of rigor in order to succeed their freshman year of college. While those pursing the work force also require academic skills, I also think they should be introduced to the job market and technical routes as part of their education.

Finally, the twenty-first century classroom will not look as it traditionally has. Instead, it will be as fully integrated with technology. I vision a school that is completely wireless, offers an online support, a resource component, and enables a one-to-one environment where there are no boundaries to limit the teacher or the students.

It is my belief and personal goal to awaken a passion for education in all students. I view education as the equalizer of our country; an educated mind is a successful mind.
